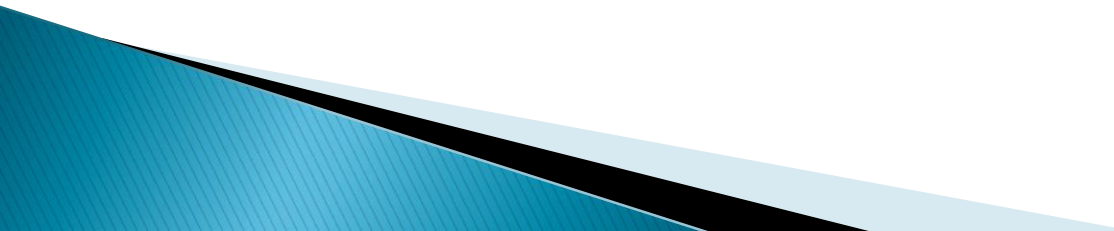



**Ripping (up) ideas about  
intervening in practice**



- ▶ What does it mean to intervene in policy and practice?
  - ▶ Policy/intervention practices vs. practices that are sustainable
  - ▶ What are our practices? What are their aims?
  - ▶ What is an intervention?
  - ▶ Who can modulate?
  - ▶ Where or what to modulate?
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- ▶ There is no 'right' intervention
  - ▶ It doesn't matter if practice interventions resemble behaviour change ones because modulation itself is useful
  - ▶ The first practice we need to intervene in is policy
  - ▶ Translation is necessary to make outside aims fit within existing practices
  - ▶ Doing is more important than telling or intending or...
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- ▶ The task is to create contexts or methods that make people users of practice theory or social science research
  - ▶ Since Rip's model of co-evolutionary governance is not yet an established practice, we need to become or recruit tricksters and translators
    - Who?
    - Can or should tricksters or translators assess impact?
