Research contracts and awards

Between 1985 and 1995 I was principal applicant for 14 research grants, together representing £298,935 of research income, including five ESRC awards. Other significant contracts were funded by the Department of Trade and Industry and the Energy Efficiency Office. While at Lancaster (since 1995) I have been principal applicant for 30 funded projects and co-applicant on a further 13. Ten of these projects have been ESRC funded, five funded by the EU and others by the EPSRC, Department for Transport, Transport for London and Unilever. Together these have generated over **£8.9 million** of external research funding. In addition I have secured funding for nine ESRC CASE studentships and three sponsored studentships, representing an additional £100,000 of non-ESRC co-funding for Lancaster research students.

Management/Leadership

As Doctoral Director (2005-2008) I was responsible for overseeing research student supervision, recruitment and administration within the department. I added new procedures for checking annual review reports for all students and personally monitored the progress of all fourth year students. This contributed to what was, at the time, a good departmental PhD completion rate of 80% within four years.

Sociology Summer Conference: In 2007 I introduced what has grown to become a major annual research student conference. This event is designed and managed by myself and a student organising committee. In 2013 the three day Sociology Summer conference was attended by 84 research students, 50 of whom were from other institutions in the UK, Europe and around the world.

Postgraduate Strategy: I have recently argued for and managed to achieve a slimmed down application process for visiting students (2012). This is a step forward for the faculty/university as a whole.
