No to Austerity, Yes to Workers' Rights!

A warm welcome back! Unfortunately, it is not such a warm welcome back for us from the government. They are still going full steam ahead with the Trade Union Bill, which we alerted you to in June's e-Bulletin. The bill will have its second reading (its first vote) in the Commons **today**. Over 100 academics have signed a letter expressing deep concern over the bill's contents. The letter describes the bill as 'the most sustained attack on trade union and workers' rights since the Combination Laws of the early 19thCentury'. The letter states;

'Trade unions in Britain are not too strong, but too weak. They provide an important voice for the expression and protection of workers' terms and conditions of employment and are a countervailing force against the excesses of employer power'.

Last week Liberty, Amnesty International and the British Institute of Human Rights issued the following statement.
'The government's plans to significantly restrict trade union rights – set out in the Trade Union Bill – represent a major attack on civil liberties in the UK... Taken together the unprecedented measures in the Bill would hamper people's basic rights to protest and shift even more power from the employee to the employer'.

In response, the TUC have organised a national, mass demonstration in Manchester outside the Conservative Party conference on **SUNDAY 4 OCTOBER at noon.** The event is also supported by the People's Assembly, which organised the End Austerity Now march in London in June, just after the elections, attracting some quarter of a million marchers. The good news is that it is in Manchester! That means that it will be much easier for many of us to get to. This is the day and the place where we can, as a society, defend the right of trade unions to protect their members as well as other employees in the workplace. Assemble at noon in Oxford Road from All Saints Park southwards, 12:30 music and opening rally, 13:30 march through the city.

What you can do:

- 1. Put the date in your diary SUNDAY 4 OCTOBER 12:00
- 2. Talk to your colleagues about the Trades Union Bill and why we, especially in the North-West, need to be at the event in Manchester
- 3. Organise a departmental contingent, book the number of seats you need on the coach leaving **Dalton Square** at **10am** by emailing <u>j.hearn@lancaster.ac.uk</u> or meet us there under the Lancaster UCU banner.

Trade Union Bill Public Meeting, Lancaster

A number of our members attended a public meeting in August in Lancaster organised by the RMT union to discuss the impact of the bill and how local unions can work together to oppose it.

Ongoing Union Recognition Agreement Negotiations

A trade union recognition agreement provides the framework in which an employer and unions negotiate on pay, terms and conditions under collective bargaining. Lancaster University's one dated back to the 1970s so over the

Checkoff payers

Deduction via payroll (checkoff) has long been, for a union such as ourselves, a means of collecting membership subs. Recent announcements by government threatening the cessation of collection of union subscriptions by checkoff in the public sector make it absolutely essential that members currently paying by checkoff are encouraged to move to direct debit as soon as possible. Members can do this online via Member eServices. Once logged in, you will need to go to 'My Subscription Details' and follow the link to 'change to direct debit'. Once you have set up your direct debit payments, please don't forget to cancel your checkoff payments by notifying University Payroll. National UCU will be writing to all members paying subscriptions by checkoff in due course but it would be very much appreciated if Lancaster UCU members paying by checkoff could please prepare themselves accordingly and respond positively to the request to change their method of payment to direct debit.
