James Buzard has written two books, Disorienting Fiction: The Autoethnographic Work of Nineteenth-Century British Novels (Princeton UP, 2005) and The Beaten Track: European Tourism, Literature, and the Ways to "Culture," 1800-1918 (Oxford UP, 1993), as well as numerous essays on nineteenth- and twentieth-century British literature and culture, the history of travel, and cultural theory. He is coeditor of a special Victorian Studies issue on "Victorian Ethnographies" (1998) and of Victorian Prism: Refractions of the Crystal Palace (U of Virginia P, 2007). He is currently working on a second volume of the Disorienting Fiction study, covering United Kingdom fiction from George Eliot to Joyce. Buzard is Professor and Head of the Literature Faculty at MIT, and he is obsessed with revolving doors.
