Dear Miss Kuhn

Although my visits to the Pictures are not very frequent, depending largely on the film, I did enjoy recently "Rob Roy" and "Braveheart" which I believe have been well received generally. I must admit I did feel rather nationalistic after the last mentioned, only one of many no doubt. I do feel there is too much violence and brutality depicted on the screen to the detriment of the younger generation of today. It is so refreshing to sit back and enjoy the very occasional uncomplicated "romantic" story, viz "Shadowlands".

I am rather amused nowadays when I compare the programmes of the earlier times which last 3-3½ hours during which time a 2d bar of Cadbury's chocolate sufficed, with today's programme of perhaps 2 hours when "a meal" of "Burgers", Icecream, Crisps, Popcorn, Drinks, etc is consumed. On my last visit to the local Odeon, three female teenagers were out and in at least three times for "ears". I jokingly remarked on the third occasion – "Are you on the Third Course now"? Time have surely changed!

I do hope I haven't taken up too much of your time reading this letter. It was not my intention to "pen" as much but I do go on once started and I have never forgotten my father, on receipt of several Trade Show invitations, commenting —

"Here's one for you Helen entitled

"Gift of the Gab".

Oh well, so it goes.
