Global engagement year

All of our degrees include a core year spent abroad which we call your 'global engagement year'. You have flexibility to either undertake a work placement or study in a country where the language you are studying is spoken. While for Chinese learners it is not possible to undertake a work placement in China due to visa restrictions, you may still complete a placement at a Chinese-speaking organisation in the UK. If you are studying multiple languages, you can split the year between different destinations. On the MLang, due to the accelerated pace of the degree, it's essential to spend the year studying.



Made for *learning*

A global and future-orientated approach

We bring a fresh, flexible and global approach to teaching modern languages and the cultural elements that surround them.

Alongside the development of language skills, you will:

- explore the pasts, presents and futures of languages and the cultures of the countries in which those languages are spoken.
- analyse major global affairs issues, examining how knowledge and understanding of languages and cultures informs our responses to global challenges such as global environmental emergencies, the global health crises, human rights and community engagement.
- learn how these topics relate to issues of race, gender, sexuality, disability, or belief in the contexts of different language communities across the world.
- reinforce your language learning through the lens of cultural studies, exploring topics such as film and visual media, literature, philosophy, art, politics and history, immersing you in varied socio-political and cultural worlds. You will learn with leading experts in their fields who bring their active, cutting-edge research into the classroom.

We will also explore the future of global languages, the impact of new technologies on how we communicate and learn languages, and new careers that are emerging for language specialists.



Learning methods

You will engage in an interactive, collaborative approach to learning supported by our academic experts. Alongside your language studies, you will apply innovative problem-based learning approaches to global affairs such as environmental challenges and climate change, politics, health care and human rights.

You will learn through a combination of interactive lectures, workshops, seminars and independent study conducted either individually or in groups.

Your learning is enhanced by teaching and assessment through our online education platform, Moodle, and the use of other interactive digital tools.

Our language classes are typically small enough for staff and students to get to know each other well and develop a strong sense of community, especially as you will join your languages by level rather than be limited to meeting fellow students in the same year group.

In addition, you'll be able to learn from first-language speakers who are international students studying at the University. We have a structured way to facilitate this and it's another great way to broaden your network.



Facilities

We have an excellent library that provides a space to engage with international media and foreign language films as a way to improve your language learning and immerse yourself in other languages and cultures.

We also provide you with self-access materials, virtual learning environments and online resources to help you to develop your own autonomous learning strategies.

By studying Languages and Global Cultures, you will become part of our School of Global Affairs, which is also home to the Confucius Institute, located in the Roundhouse, and equipped with a social space plus kitchen for learning, social activity and events.

Proficiency test centre

We are an official language proficiency test centre for Chinese, French and Spanish. This means you could prepare for and take proficiency tests in other languages, outside your studies. You could potentially gain additional internationally recognised qualifications in this way.

Guest lecturers

We regularly invite guest lecturers to teach on our degrees. This allows you to engage with language professionals and brings real-world experience into the academic environment. Some examples of recent guests:

- Diana Coromines i Calders, Translator in Residence and journalist, writer, editor and diplomat and polyglot in six languages, born in Catalonia and based in Denmark, ran specialised workshops on the creative aspects of Spanish literary translation and employability sessions exploring potential career opportunities for all our students.
- Round table with our Translator in Residence Jack Hargreaves on Human Translation in the Age of AI.
- Investigative Journalists as Cultural Mediators in an Age of Threat: Examples from Mexico and the Amazon, with John Gibler.



Global *engagement* year

You'll spend one year of your degree abroad on a global engagement year. On our BA degrees you have options to study or work abroad during your third year. There is also flexibility to combine different activities so you can improve your language skills in a variety of settings. Here are the options:

Language Assistant with the British Council

In this role, you support the teaching of English in a school or college, plan extracurricular activities and produce learning resources. It is a great way to explore the start of a career in teaching. Please note, this opportunity is only available to students of French, German and Spanish, but not Chinese.

Work placement

Engage with the local culture and community while developing professional skills by completing a work placement.

Examples of previous student placements include archival research, business development chamber of commerce internship, cyber intelligence, culture and language facilitation, events coordination, international relations, translation, text production and editing.

Study abroad

You can choose to study with one of our well-established partner universities. This enhances your language skills whilst offering the chance to make a host of international friends and experience learning in a different culture and context.

There are plenty of study or work abroad opportunities, including destinations across Europe, Asia and South America. On my year abroad, I studied at L'Université Bordeaux-Montaigne in France, and the second half of the year was spent studying at UIC Barcelona in Spain. This experience was genuinely the best year of my life, where I made memories to last me a lifetime. The chance to travel and experience new cultures and meet diverse people was so fun. I loved going to my classes and being immersed in French and Spanish language and culture. Gain *real-world* experience

We know you want to graduate confident and ready to step into your career. That's why we make it easy to incorporate work experience into your time at Lancaster. Your ambitions are important to us, and we will help you build the skills you need to succeed by offering a range of placement and internship opportunities.

Work placements abroad

You can research and apply for international work placements to conduct on your global engagement year. We support you with this competitive process. Chinese learners are unable to complete a work placement in China due to visa restrictions, but may work at a Chinese-speaking organisation in the UK instead.

British Council placements

For students of French, German and Spanish, we work with the British Council to coordinate opportunities for you to spend your global engagement year working as an English language teaching assistant abroad.

Discovery placement

On this optional module, you can take up a short placement to work with an organisation needing internationalisation support, such as a local school, school abroad, translation company, research project, charity/NGO, or small/medium sized enterprise.

Faculty of Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences Internship Scheme

You'll gain sector-relevant work experience with these internships. Apply in all years of study for opportunities such as publishing assistant, content delivery manager or assistant events producer. The scheme offers you an opportunity to gain access to direct work experience while you study.



The Lancaster Award

The Lancaster Award is a non-academic certificate developed in partnership with employers to help you make the most of your time at Lancaster and to demonstrate the skills you have developed along the way. It is designed to reward the wide range of volunteering activities and placements undertaken by many of our undergraduates. Potential employers increasingly value a profile that includes more than just strong academic results, and the Lancaster Award recognises and validates this.

For Chinese learners

The Confucius Institute here on campus provides a variety of volunteering opportunities in weekend language classes for children, after school clubs, Chinese Days in local schools and festival celebrations.





Language lunch clubs

You can bring your lunch (or brunch!) along to these social events to informally practise your conversational language skills. Practice makes perfect and errors are part of improving, so never miss an opportunity to speak. Our communal social spaces are perfect for catching up with friends, sharing some food and finding out the latest news.

Social events

Even if you cannot attend our lunch clubs, we have plenty of other opportunities to practise your language skills. Examples include film nights in the target language followed by discussion about the films, international quiz evenings with questions relating to the languages we teach and the places they are spoken, and games evenings. Last but by no means least, we organise regular karaoke nights where you can sing in any language you know except for English, and in this way discover new artists, languages and songs.

All of these social events provide opportunities to practise the languages you speak in informal, relaxed contexts and become a part of the thriving community at the University of both language learners as well as speakers of other languages from across the world.

Societies

Our students take part in a very wide range of student societies, including language societies with the Lancaster University Students' Union.

Chinese Friendship Programme

The Confucius Institute has a Lancaster Chinese Friendship Programme that pairs students studying Chinese as part of their degree with first-language Chinese speakers. As part of the programme, we organise activities for students to enjoy together.



Languages and Global Cultures

BA (Hons)

Study a combination of Chinese, French, German or Spanish as a core language from advanced or beginner's level. Add discovery languages to the mix, including beginner's level Italian.

This degree offers a fresh, flexible, and global approach to modern languages and cultures. You will explore the past, present, and future of global cultures, analysing major global issues and how language and cultural knowledge shape responses to these challenges.

Alongside language development, you will study topics such as the climate emergency, global health crises, human rights, and community engagement. You will learn how these topics intersect with issues of race, gender, sexuality, disability, and belief across diverse language communities around the world.

Your language learning will be enriched by cultural studies, covering film, visual media, literature, art, and history, providing a comprehensive understanding of the societal contexts of your chosen languages.

Additionally, you will investigate the future of global languages, the role of emerging technologies, and the evolving career opportunities for language specialists.

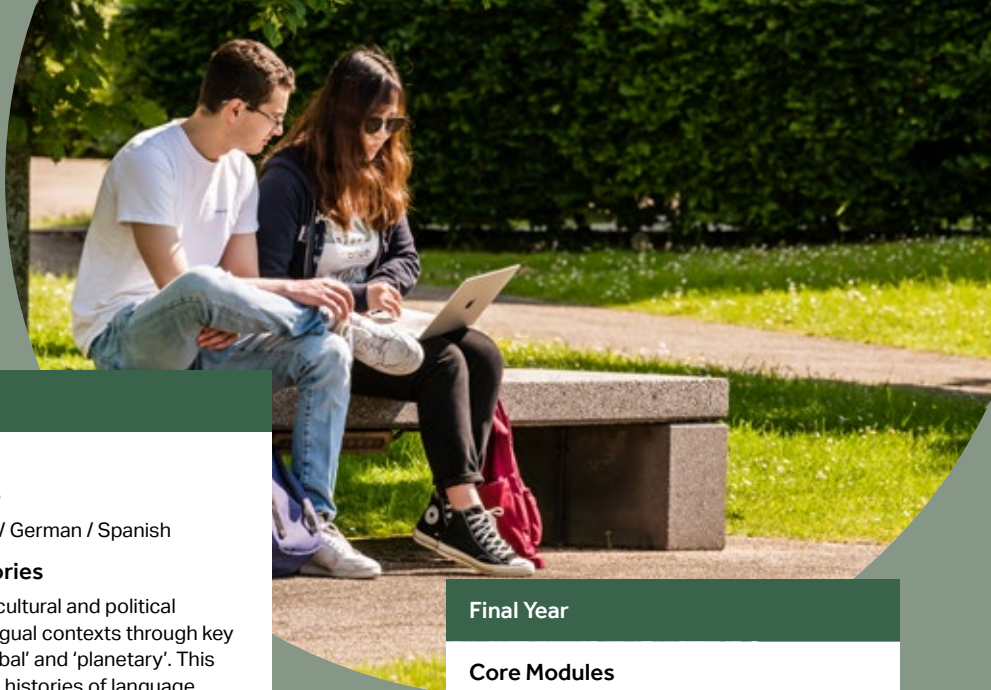

A distinct feature of this degree is that you study in classes organised by language level (as measured by the Common European Framework of Reference or the Chinese HSK). Whatever year of your degree you are in, you'll be in classes with students who match your level in that language.

MLang Languages and Global Cultures

BA with integrated master's study

Deep dive into the fascinating world of language, where words become bridges to understanding and cultures come alive through communication. For those that excel in language learning, this degree will enable you to fast-track your learning.

In your first year, you will develop your core language skills (in one or two languages) at advanced level whilst exploring the presence of languages and cultures across the globe. If you join with one language, you can also study a discovery language – Chinese, German, French, Italian or Spanish – from beginner's level.

You spend your second year studying abroad at one of our established partner universities around the world to enhance your core language skills. You return to Lancaster for your third year and progress to postgraduate modules in your fourth year.

Alongside the development of your language skills, you learn about the pasts, presents and futures of languages and the cultures of the countries in which those languages are spoken. You will explore major global affairs issues, examining how knowledge and understanding of languages and cultures informs our responses to global challenges.

As you progress in the language(s) you are studying whilst abroad, you will produce a reflective portfolio. You will also be required to write a project in the target language(s) on topics that you have researched in your host country.

Careers and *employability*

By studying languages and global cultures, you have the chance to graduate with a multilingual, multicultural skills set.

Apart from language and subject-related skills, a degree in languages develops rich interpersonal, intercultural, cognitive and transferable skills that can be utilised across a variety of careers.

Careers consultants

We have staff who advise students on their strengths and possible future careers. Employability resources and job ads are uploaded and constantly updated on our web platform. We also have active alumni Facebook and LinkedIn groups to stay in touch and continue to promote opportunities to you once you have graduated.

Within the Faculty of Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences, there are specialist careers advisors and opportunities to apply for internships to help you gain experience and prepare for your future career.

Careers events

We hold 'Careers with Languages' events where you can meet major employers who recruit graduates with language skills. Other events focus on the demands of the current job market. These include welcoming alumni to share insights about their careers in a 'languages and employability panel', a video interview techniques workshop, a CV workshop, and training in translation software.

Graduate destinations

Language graduates progress into multilingual roles in business such as sales, management and consulting; translation and interpreting; language teaching; roles in the travel and tourism sector.

More generally, graduates are well-suited to a wide range of roles which require collaboration, communication and leadership skills, critical thinking and clarity of communication as well as intercultural competencies and creativity.

Beyond language-related and international professional contexts, we envisage our multilingual graduates able to embrace careers that have a strong element of implementing global solutions.

These include print, digital and broadcast media; journalism; publishing and publishing; business, sales and marketing; government and NGO policy roles; public administration and civil service; roles intelligence and security; and in the arts, including the GLAM (galleries, libraries, archives and museums) sector.

Language graduates might choose to pursue careers in a very wide range of roles, such as:
