Welcome

This degree brings together the study of religious traditions from around the world with the major global issues that are impacting societies, including war, decolonisation, development, gender, sexuality, state and government, violence, peace, protest, and race. In our teaching we emphasise curiosity, exploration, openness and understanding.

Religion plays a vital role in shaping societies, cultures and politics around the world. From Britain to the Middle East, South Asia, Africa, and Europe, this degree invites you to explore questions of ethics and values that define how individuals and societies understand themselves and their place in the world. How can modernity integrate with tradition? How can ethics influence politics? What does it mean to have agency and freedom of choice? How have people expressed the struggle for agency across cultures and time? And how can one navigate the world's constraints while maintaining personal freedom?

You will learn to navigate the religious dimensions of these and other issues in a global context, including the Middle East, South Asia, and Africa, not to mention Europe and the United Kingdom. In addition to studying global religions such as Islam, Christianity, Buddhism and Hinduism, you will also be introduced to a range of new religions, indigenous traditions, and contemporary spiritualities. These will be explored using a number of methods drawn from anthropology, sociology, philosophy, politics, and history.

We use a range of teaching methods that are appropriate for the wide variety of topics that you will study in global religions.

- + Lectures are used to provide overviews of the core theories, themes and evidence you need to know.
- Discussion seminars will provide you with a space to expand on your own views on topics through engaging in vibrant debates to improve your critical understanding in safe supportive environments.
- Workshop activities will provide you with the chance to engage in problem solving exercises, comparative thinking, and develop important team working skills.
- + Your time will be divided between timetabled learning, independent learning time for reading and research tasks and meetings with academic staff.
- + Every module will have a dedicated Moodle website as part of the University's virtual learning environment.
 This is used for uploading key learning and support content and for contacting staff and other students.
- + You will have a dedicated academic advisor who will provide you with regular meetings and academic guidance throughout your studies.



 Assessment tasks vary according to what is appropriate for each subject area. We place particular emphasis on giving you the opportunity to research topics of interest more widely as your studies progress and in using assessment to develop key professional skills. This can include essays, research diaries, and case study research.

We cover Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism, world Christianity, and new religious movements. We study them in many regions of the world – from their places of origin to contemporary Britain.

We combine approaches from many academic disciplines. We examine religious texts, philosophical ideas, histories, and changing social forms. We take decolonial and comparative perspectives. We engage with major themes in contemporary British and global politics and in international relations.

Our lecturers and professors are widely recognised in the study of religious traditions. We aim to show you the many ways in which religion matters. Lancaster is the place to come to if you want to understand the place of religion in the world, past and present!

Placement year

You can opt to study your degree with a placement year (also known as a year in industry). On this degree you spend your third year working in a graduate-level, professional job in a sector of your choice before returning to complete your final year at Lancaster University. Securing a placement is a competitive process and we support you with personalised coaching and professional guidance.

Faculty of Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences Internship Scheme

You'll gain sector-relevant work experience and get paid for it with these internships. Apply in all years of study for opportunities in areas such as public affairs, marketing, business development and events. The scheme is delivered by our faculty employability team who are here to support your access to direct work experience while you study.

Richardson Institute internships

Our School is home to the Richardson Institute, which undertakes cutting-edge peace and conflict research. Research themes include transnational repression, human rights, conflict resolution, and identity and belonging. The Institute runs an internship programme where you can gain research experience working alongside leading policy and research organisations such as NGOs, think tanks, charities and faith-based organisations. You'll develop analytical skills and put your academic learning into practice in real-world contexts.

Study abroad

You can choose to study your degree with a study abroad year. On these four-year degrees, you spend your third year studying at one of our partner universities abroad. Our current partners are in Australia, Canada and the USA, although availability of destinations varies each year.

Living in another country and studying your subject from a different perspective enhances your subject knowledge and develops resourcefulness for life after university.

Vacation travel and overseas summer schools

You can also discover the world during your vacations. We run short trips to destinations such as China, Germany, Ghana, Malaysia and Switzerland. These trips include meeting local students and businesses as well as some academic study and cultural discovery.

In addition, you can attend summer schools at one of our many overseas partners.

Global Religions

BA (Hons)

Religion is central to our everevolving relationships with the world, others, and ourselves. You'll explore themes such as women and gender, conflict and peace, and societies and states, all in a truly global context.

This degree brings together the study of religious traditions from around the world with the major global issues that are impacting societies, including war, decolonisation, development, gender, sexuality, state and government, violence, peace, protest, and race. In our teaching we emphasise curiosity, exploration, openness and understanding.

From India to the Middle East, and Africa, religion plays a vital role in shaping political and cultural identities. You will explore questions of ethics and values that lie at the heart of how individuals and societies shape themselves. How can modernity integrate with tradition? How can ethics shape politics? What is choice and a free self? How have people expressed the struggle for agency across cultures and time? How can one live in the world and yet be free of its constraints?

You will learn to navigate the religious dimensions of these and other issues in a global context, including the Middle East, South Asia, and Africa, not to mention Europe and the United Kingdom. In addition to studying demographically significant religions such as Islam, Christianity, Buddhism and Hinduism, you will also be introduced to a range of methods of studying global religions through political, philosophical, sociological, and anthropological ways of thinking.

Year 1

Core Modules Place and Global Religions

This module introduces students to the study of religions in cultural spaces, exploring myth, philosophy, and worship within different societies.

State, Law and Religion

This module integrates perspectives from religious studies, politics and law. It offers the opportunity to think about key political and religious concepts and themes.

Community and Global Religions

This module introduces you to the study of religions through the perspective of communities. You will assess the dynamics between communities and societies including conflict and rapprochement.

Global Challenges in World Politics

This module provides you with a nuanced understanding of the forces driving change in the international system and their implications for global order and human security, equipping you with the tools to navigate and contribute to a complex and interconnected world.

Global Philosophy

Encounter philosophical traditions that have until recently tended not to be studied in Western universities, but in which Lancaster has particular expertise.

Thinking Globally

What does it mean to think in and about the world? This module will draw on disciplines from across the School of Global Affairs to think about the very different ways in which the world can be imagined.



Year 2

Core Modules Critical Approaches in Global Religions

Learn about the major critical approaches, themes, theories, and issues in the study of global religions. You will gain an understanding of key methods, including those drawn from sociology, anthropology, psychology, cultural studies and philosophy.

Global Religions, Conflict and Peace

This module explores the relationship between religion, culture, conflict and peace. As well as introducing you to particular examples drawn from Africa, Asia, Europe, North America, and the Middle East, it will also provide you with a good understanding of key theories and debates about peace and conflict, intercultural and interreligious relations, and peacebuilding. Through this module, you will acquire critical and practical skills which may be applied in your career and everyday life.

Women and Gender in Global Religions

Explore how issues concerning gender, womanhood and sexuality have played out in relation to religious life and thought across the world and through time.

Final Year

Core Modules Voices from Global Religions

This module prioritises authenticity, with sensitivity to context and the ways followers understand and feel about their beliefs. Focusing on scriptures, stories, songs, and philosophical discussions from religions and spiritual traditions around the world, the module provides a view of belief 'from the inside.' You will study materials from, for example, Hinduism, Islam, Christianity, Buddhism, African traditions, new religions, and contemporary spirituality.

Love and Friendship: Global Perspectives

This cross-disciplinary module explores how love and friendship have been understood and lived across cultures and eras, from antiquity through to modern times. The course will survey materials from Africa, the Middle East, South Asia, China, and Europe, examining diverse intellectual traditions and literary genres. You will explore the development of ideas about love and friendship in philosophical, religious, and literary contexts, comparing the works of diverse range of thinkers, artists, poets, and mystics.

Global Religions Dissertation

Under the guidance of a supervisor, you will spend time researching an area of particular personal interest. The topic may be inspired by a module you've taken, or it may be something you've been fascinated by for a long time. Whatever you choose, the aim is to enable you to develop your research skills by exploring a topic that appeals to you.
