# Campus in the City


Campus in the City (CITC) is a university-wide project led by the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences Enterprise Centre (FASS EC). Its aims are to:

- Enable the local community to see what happens on campus on an everyday basis and engage with the research and other activities taking place
- Provide academics and students with a chance to work
  with the public, to showcase their work and other activities,
  achieve research impact, (the demonstrable contribution
  research makes to society and the economy), and to
  evidence that impact.

CITC 2 was a partnership project with the following organisations:

- Lancaster and Morecambe College: who renovated the CITC shop space providing their Construction students with critical real life experience and ran events in the space.
- The Dukes: who kindly provided staff members and films for foreign language and science fiction film evenings
- Lancaster Business Improvement District: who generously contributed to CITC financially and occupied the shop every Monday
- Lancaster and District Chamber of Commerce: who helped market the project and ran events in the shop
- Lancaster City Council: who gave us 5 Cheapside, the CITC base, rent-free

## **Event Case**Studies

#### Creativity and Connectivity - 80 visitors

"CITC provided a great way to make contact with hard to reach participant groups (elderly adults)"

Professor Emma Rose organised this event which sought to measure the effect art can have in beating social exclusion for older people. 40 people attended a day in the CITC shop and were taught to paint by professional artists and students from the University. Their work was exhibited at a private viewing and later opened to the public resulting in 40 visitors viewing the work. Sally Naden (BBC Radio Lancashire) broadcast from the shop reporting on the event throughout the day.



"CITC allowed us to talk to the public about what we do at the Babylab. This is very important to us, because our research involves parents and children coming to campus to take part in our studies. We recruited lots of infants for our research, and the event gave us the chance to engage with parents"

Lancaster Babylab works to answer questions about how children learn about the world in the first few years of their life. It focuses on how babies learn to understand the world around them, become active and understanding partners in social interactions, and master one of the most puzzling of phenomena – language. CITC provided Babylab with a chance to engage a wider range of people and recruit more children for their research. Over 2 days families were welcomed into the CITC space to find out more about babies' learning processes.



# **Event Case**Studies

#### Care and Compassion Practices - 96 visitors

"Campus in the City was an enjoyable and inspiring experience through which I met a diversity of people and learned about their experiences of compassion in care"

The event aimed to gather, collate and share the experiences and views of anyone involved in caring – carers, practitioners and those being cared for – about the diverse practices that make up compassionate care. Visitors, including a group of primary school children, engaged in activities to attempt to identify common perceptions of compassionate care. Visitors were also encouraged to talk about their understanding and experiences of compassion in care, and were offered the chance to be involved in the project as it continued.

The workshop was developed in response to the exhibition 'Museum of Water' which was exhibited at the Storey Gallery from 20th - 22nd February. Four different water based craft activities were developed which both children and adults could enjoy.

The aim of the workshop was to introduce the Lancaster community to the themes addressed by the exhibition and to encourage visitors to take their creations up to the exhibition itself.

In addition to craft activities visitors were invited to help develop the storytelling aspect of the exhibition by sharing their own stories over a cup of tea.

#### Safe Child Africa - 120 visitors


Safe Child Africa ran a full day-to-evening event at Campus in the City. During the day, other local charities were invited and hosted in the space to display their work to the public. During the evening 'No Child Should Live in Fear', showcased the work of Safe Child Africa and its achievements over the last 10 years. The event was a chance to highlight the continuing innovation of the NGO in Residence scheme: facilitating and strengthening the relationships between academics and the third sector.

#### Streets of Mourning - 349 visitors

The only event to be repeated from CITC 1 due to its popularity with the local community, Streets of Mourning showcased outreach work with schools and other local organisations around the impact of World War I as well as the Streets of Mourning website itself, which allows Lancaster residents to find out what happened to the occupants of their house during World War I. During the event, actors dressed as World War I soldiers were on hand to talk about life in the trenches and George Green from the Department of English and Creative Writing shared his grandmother's memories of life during the war. We were also very pleased to welcome Year 6 pupils from Moorside Primary School and the Mayor of Lancaster.



### Feedback and the Future

#### Lancaster feedback

#### 5756 visitors engaged with CITC 2 events

428 people voted across the three 'Vote Campus in the City' polls, which asked questions about their feelings about the project.

- 92% of voters felt more connected to the university having visited CITC
- 94% of voters would like to see Campus in the City in Lancaster on a full-time basis
- 99% of voters want CITC repeated in 2016

We are currently looking at expanding CITC by taking it to new places (whilst continuing in Lancaster city centre.) Possibilities include Cumbria (Barrow In Furness or Carlisle) amongst others

### Feedback from external organisations and partners

100% of those external collaborators who responded to the survey said they would participate again if CITC was repeated in the future

100% of those external collaborators who responded to the survey said their objectives were met

"Good site, well presented, with appropriate equipment and facilities, and excellent support from staff."

#### Academic feedback

80% of the academics who responded to the survey said they felt their research had benefitted from CITC\*

\*some correspondents used CITC purely for public engagement rather than trying to benefit their research

93% of academics who responded to our survey said they would participate in CITC if it was repeated in 2016

"CITC is vital to our impact projects and data, providing very strong evidence we will be mobilising in the next REF. It also allows us to provide partners with expertise and public exposure which cements external relationships. Vital!"

"Engaging with the public allows me to understand and/or anticipate some of their responses to my work. It also helps remind me that while research is academic, my aims for publishing are both in the professional sphere to a general audience and of publishing my critical writing to an academic one. My research becomes more inclusive when I put faces to readers."

### Expansion and Development

The original Campus in the City started in 2014, running for 11 weeks in a commercial unit in St Nicholas Arcades (the sole project partner). The event was widely considered a success with 3384 visitors to the shop, 30 events run and 228 people voting for CITC to be repeated. The project garnered widespread media attention from local to national press and radio, featuring in the media over 27 times.

Campus In The City 2 in 2015 expanded upon the success of 2014, this time with 5 partners. Despite only running for 10 weeks this year's CITC saw 5756 visitors engaged through 62 different events. 428 people voted across three different polls regarding CITC's future and again the project caught the attention of the media 21 times, including being featured in the *Times Higher Education* Supplement twice.

Researchers from academic subjects across all four faculties in the University and the Students' Union (LUSU), reflecting the growing popularity and appreciation of the project across campus.

Recently other universities have expressed an interest in the CITC model and possibilities of joint working.
