


SUCCESS ON A PLATE: Kitchen worker Paul Paterson at Fulwood Hall Hospital is now training to become a doctor

Working in a hospital kitchen was meant to be a stopgap summer job for one Lancashire lad. But working in a hospital setting gave him a taste for medicine, and he is now training to become a doctor. Health Reporter AASMA DAY finds out more



Ribbleton, Preston, who is a former pupil of Fulwood High School, was so determined to become a medic, he studied science A-levels during the evenings at Preston College for four years, in his desire to win a place on the medical course.

After leaving school, Paul worked in a bookshop for a couple of years, and then went to St Andrews University to do a degree in philosophy. Following this, he was unsure about what career to go into,

and decided to study a twoyear postgraduate course in philosophy in London. Paul says: "I did the first year of my postgraduate course, but I did not end up completing it because of money worries

'I had a lot of debt, and was funding the course myself. I wanted to work off some of my debt, so I decided to postpone my second year and earn a bit of money.

"But the way things worked out, it ended up being a permanent postponement." Paul moved back home to Preston, and began looking for some employment. His mum was one of the housekeepers at Fulwood Hall Hospital, and told him there was a vacancy in the hospital kitchens.

Paul says: "My roles were taking food out on the trollies to patients, serving food to patients and staff, washing up

and taking food orders. "It was initially only meant to be a summer job, but I ended up doing it for a year." Paul found that the part of his job he enjoyed the most was his contact with patients, and it gave him the first inkling

that he would like to become a doctor. After a year at Fulwood Hall

Hospital, a job came up in theatre as a healthcare assistant, and Paul began working there.

He enjoyed this job immensely, as it gave him a greater insight into surgery, and his tasks included helping set up theatre for operations, giving equipment to surgeons during operations, and helping clean theatre and equipment after

the procedures. Paul says: "I found it quite fascinating, and I saw a whole range of different procedures, and I felt like I was going behind the scenes of hospitals, and seeing what happened in theatre.

"I saw everything from the re-moval of lumps to spinal ops, knee surgery and hip replacements.'


